Conference Objectives

The SPPAC aims to advance SPP's mission to promote the health and psychological well-being of children, youth and their families through science and an evidence-based approach to practice, education, training, advocacy, and consultation by:

- 1) Advancing the science of pediatric psychology and related fields through dissemination of cutting edge research; promotion of research that is culturally, ethically and developmentally sensitive and includes diverse populations; and education on evidence-based assessment, intervention, and emerging areas of research, clinical care, and policy.
- 2) Providing a forum for individuals at all levels, from students to established investigators and clinicians, to facilitate consultation, collaboration, and mentorship.
- 3) Promoting the role and value of pediatric psychology in a changing healthcare environment nationally and internationally.

Continuing Education



The Society of Pediatric Psychology (Division 54 of the American Psychological Association) is approved by the American Psychological

Association to sponsor continuing education for psychologists. The Society of Pediatric Psychology maintains responsibility for this program and its contents. There are 14.5 scheduled hours of Introductory to Intermediate level CEs for psychologists offered at SPPAC 2015, with additional CEs available for those who attend the preconference and lunch-and-learn workshops. 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ABOUT OUR SPEAKERS

Keynote Address



Ken Resnicow, PhD is Irwin M. Rosenstock Collegiate Professor, Health Behavior and Health Education, School of Public Health at the University of Michigan, UM Cancer Center Director of Health Disparities Research, and a senior leader at the Center for Health Communications Research (CHCR). His research interests include use of motivational interviewing and tailored e-health intervention to address prevention and management of chronic diseases,

organ donation, medical adherence and screening behaviors. Much of his work focuses on African-Americans and other ethnic/racial minorities, addressing the relationship between ethnicity and health behaviors. He has trained more than 1,000 health professionals in motivational interviewing in both academic and health care delivery settings. His work is informed by chaos theory, complexity science and self-determination theory. His current studies include an NIH-funded project to test the impact of ethnic and novel motivational tailoring of colorectal screening materials for African-Americans; two Department of Transplantation studies to increase organ donation rates among African-Americans working in Michigan "Greek" organizations, churches and dialysis centers; and an NIH-funded study to reduce obesity using motivational interviewing working with the American Academy of Pediatrics PROS practices. He has published more than 250 peer-reviewed articles and book chapters and has served on numerous advisory panels and review groups. Dr. Resnicow also is president of Academic Assistance, a health care consulting and motivational interviewing training firm. Recent and current corporate and health care delivery clients include Aetna, AmeriHealth Caritas, Principal Financial, Nationwide, the Veterans Administration, numerous universities and the National Health Group of Singapore. This work has focused on designing and implementing health coaching and disease management programs for health care delivery systems using motivational interviewing and novel behavioral interventions.

International Keynote Speaker



Vicki Anderson, PhD is a pediatric neuropsychologist who has 30 years' experience. Dr. Anderson is the director, Clinical Sciences Research, Murdoch Childrens Research Institute and a professorial fellow in the Departments of Psychology & Paediatrics at the University of Melbourne. Her research and clinical interests are in disorders of childhood that impact on the

central nervous system, including both developmental and acquired disorders. Her research team has contributed to this field by establishing the vulnerability of the young brain to injury and the importance of the family in maximizing recovery from childhood injury and illness. Her recent work has established an evidence base for e-health approaches to parent-focused psychosocial treatments as a means of maximizing child outcomes and improving family function. Dr. Anderson has published more than 250 papers and five books in this field and has over \$20 million in competitive research funds. Dr. Anderson is an associate editor of *Neuropsychology* and *Journal of Neuropsychology*. She has served on the Board of Governors of the International Neuropsychological Society. She is a fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences of Australia and of the Australian Psychological Society.

Diversity Keynote Speaker



Amy C. Tishelman, PhD is a clinical psychologist with an abiding interest in clinical work with vulnerable children and families, as well as in scholarship designed to enhance clinical care. She has worked extensively in the areas of gender and sexual development of children and youth, trauma and child maltreatment, and pediatric psychology, and speaks frequently on issues related to her areas of expertise. She is currently the director of clinical

research and a senior staff psychologist for the Disorders of Sexual Development-Gender Management Service (DSD-GeMS) at Boston Children's Hospital (BCH), the first clinic to care for transgender youth housed in an academic pediatric medical center in North America. In this role, she has been invited to lead the effort to build a research program related to the health and well-being of transgender and gender nonconforming youth, as well as youth with DSD. She is also director of psychological services for the BCH Department of Urology and holds a faculty position at Harvard Medical School. In addition, Dr. Tishelman is employed as research director and senior staff psychologist for the Child Protection Program at Massachusetts General Hospital. Dr. Tishelman is on the editorial boards of several journals, and recently co-edited special double issues of the *Journal of Child Sexual Abuse* and the *Journal of Child and Adolescent Trauma*.

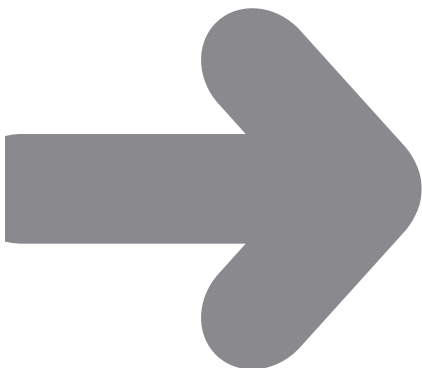

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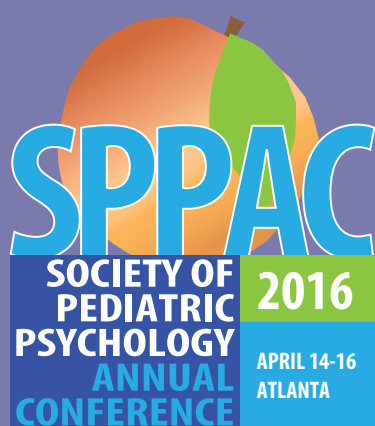
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
