

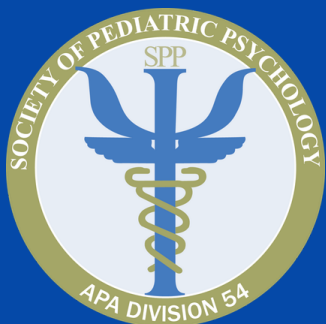

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## Plenaries:



### Lamia P. Barakat, PhD

Lamia P. Barakat, PhD, is a Professor in Pediatrics (primary) and Psychiatry at the University of Pennsylvania Perelman School of Medicine, the Stephen and Susan Kelly Endowed Chair in Behavioral Oncology, Director of the Psychosocial Services and Behavioral Oncology Research Programs, and co-Division Chief for Integrated Psychiatry, Psychology, and Behavioral Health. Utilizing digital health strategies and co-production with adolescents and young adults (AYA) and caregivers, her research focuses on evidence-based assessment of psychosocial risk and resilience in families of children newly diagnosed with cancer and in the transition off treatment, development and implementation of family interventions to improve disease management and health-related quality of life, understanding and enhancing cancer-related decision-making for adolescents and young adults with newly diagnosed cancer, and strategies to promote successful transition to adult healthcare. Current projects include implementation of psychosocial screening across 18 children's cancer programs in the United States, a pilot randomized trial of a web-based decision support tool for AYA with cancer, a multi-site randomized controlled trial of meaning-focused grief therapy for caregivers bereaved of childhood cancer, and a recently completed PCORI project testing three approaches to transition care for AYA with sickle cell disease. Dr. Barakat serves on the International Society of Pediatric Oncology Scientific Committee, the Children's Oncology Group Behavioral Science Steering Committee, and several editorial boards.



### Yalda T. Uhls, PhD, MBA

Dr. Yalda T. Uhls is a developmental psychologist and the founder and CEO of the Center for Scholars & Storytellers (CSS) at UCLA, a research organization dedicated to bridging developmental science with entertainment media. Before founding CSS, she spent more than 15 years as a senior film executive at MGM and Sony Pictures, bringing real-world storytelling and business experience into her research on youth development and wellbeing. At CSS, Dr. Uhls partners with major media companies—including YouTube, Netflix, Disney, and Activision—to integrate developmental science into creative decisions. Her work helps storytellers understand how children and adolescents interpret narratives, form identity, and respond to representation, making media not just entertaining but supportive of healthy development and inclusion.

As a researcher and faculty member in UCLA's Department of Psychology, Dr. Uhls studies how media and technology influence the social, emotional, and cognitive development of preteens and teens. She is the author of *Media Moms & Digital Dads*. Her research has been featured in *The New York Times*, *Time Magazine*, *Good Morning America*, *USA Today*, *NPR*, and numerous other outlets across 32 countries, as well as in multiple peer-reviewed journals. Dr. Uhls frequently speaks at research, public health, and creative-industry forums, and advocates for authentically inclusive storytelling and cross-sector collaboration to build healthier developmental ecosystems for youth.

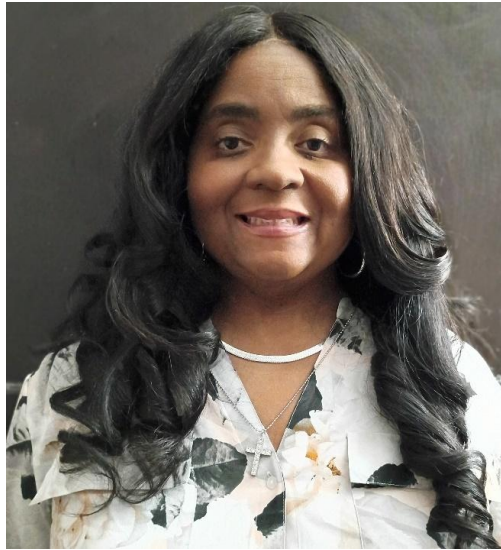
## Panelists:

Kelsey Freeman



Kelsey is a young adult with a longstanding history of chronic pain. Kelsey suffers from debilitating chronic pain that has interfered with many aspects of her life. She will share her challenges navigating the medical system because of diagnostic uncertainty, pain invisibility, and biased interactions with medical providers, ***and how she has partnered with researchers to advocate for change.***

Tajmaletty Freeman



Tajmaletty Freeman is the parent of Kelsey Freeman. Tajmaletty's daughter has a longstanding history of chronic pain. Tajmaletty will share her lived experiences of racialized pain inequities as a parent advocate. She will touch on the challenges she witnessed as she navigated the medical system because of the delayed care, pain invisibility, and biased interactions with medical providers. Tajmaletty will also describe her advocacy work for the past two years within the Chronic Pain Advocacy Group led by Dr. Emily Wakefield's team and provide recommendations on how to successfully partner with marginalized adolescents with chronic illnesses and their families to address racial health inequities.

Mike Hoffman, PhD



Dr. Michael Hoffman is a Pediatric Psychologist at Children’s Hospital of Philadelphia within the Center for Childhood Communication and an Assistant Professor of Psychiatry in the Perelman School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. He provides integrated psychological services with an emphasis patient-centered, collaborative care for deaf and hard of hearing children and their families. Dr. Hoffman serves on the cochlear implant team. He has also developed a tiered model of service to screen all DHH patients and provide brief interventions for challenges related to deafness (deaf identity, adjustment to hearing loss/limited device usage, family stress related to hearing loss, academic/peer difficulties, and traditional psychiatric diagnoses such as anxiety, depression, and ADHD). Dr. Hoffman is deaf himself, and utilizes one cochlear implant and one hearing aid.

Kamal Marell and Lisa Suarez



Kamal Marell and Lisa Suarez are the proud parents of Quincy Marell, their 2½-year-old son who was born with bilateral sensorineural hearing loss caused by a WFS1 gene mutation. After a confirmed progression of Quincy’s hearing loss in early September 2025, he received cochlear implants in December 2025, an important milestone in his hearing journey.

Kamal and Lisa were recently married and share their home together in Philadelphia.

Kamal, a Philadelphia native, works in the Advancement department at Swarthmore College. Before joining Swarthmore, he served as Executive Director of a nonprofit supporting young adults transitioning out of foster care.

Lisa, originally from Eden Prairie, Minnesota, moved to Philadelphia in 2005 to attend Temple University. She has built a 16-year career as an underwriter at an employee benefits consulting firm, where she continues to work today as a Senior Financial Leader.

Together, Kamal and Lisa are committed to advocating for Quincy and supporting the broader hearing-loss and cochlear-implant community through awareness, connection, and shared experience.

Elizabeth R. Pulgaron, PhD



Dr. Pulgaron a bicultural, bilingual, licensed psychologist, who has dedicated her career to increasing access to quality mental health care for at-risk and marginalized youth. Her specialty by training is pediatric psychology, she has worked continuously with interdisciplinary teams across multiple settings and systems. During her career she has worked on various research protocols for families of children with chronic conditions (such as sickle cell disease, persistent asthma, diabetes, and obesity) including multisite NIH funded longitudinal trials and randomized control trials. She has spent a significant amount of her professional career working in the community. Schools, community centers, primary care offices, and summer camps are all setting in which she has provided services and conducted clinical research.

Dr. Pulgaron is an Associate Professor of Clinical Pediatrics at the University of Miami's Miller School of Medicine, and the Director of Psychosocial Services for the John T. McDonald School Health Initiative. She provides direct clinical services, supervise social workers, psychology residents and fellows, and engages in clinical research in community settings. Dr. Pulgaron has developed and successfully implemented mental health screening protocols in school-based health centers. She advocates for students' psychosocial functioning by serving as the Chair for the School Health Advisory Committee for Miami-Dade County Public Schools and lead the Promoting Behavioral Health Interprofessional Collaborative at the Mailman Center for Child Development.

Emily Wakefield, PhD



Dr. Emily Wakefield is a pediatric pain psychology researcher at Connecticut Children's and an Associate Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Connecticut School of Medicine. Her NIH-funded research focuses on understanding pain-related stigma among children with chronic pain who often experience pain disbelief by others. A key aspect of her work involves partnering with youth living with chronic pain and their caregivers to improve access to pain care and chronic pain resources for families. She will discuss the importance of her work collaborating with Kelsey, her mother Tajmaletty, and other families through the Chronic Pain Advocacy Group, as well as effective strategies for engaging in this important work.

Lori Crosby



Dr. Lori Crosby is a Tenured Professor in the Division of Behavioral Medicine and Clinical Psychology at Cincinnati Children's Hospital and the University of Cincinnati, Department of Pediatrics. Dr. Crosby is the director of her own research lab which conducts a wide range of applied, translational, community-based and health services. She is also the Co-Director of Innovations in Community Research, Division of Behavioral Health and Medicine and Director of the CCTST, Community Engagement Core. Over the years, Dr. Crosby's research focuses on self-management, treatment adherence, transition, design-thinking, implementation science, shared decision-making and recruitment and retention in research.

Malika Muhammad



Malika Muhammad is a person born with Sickle Cell Anemia (SS) and from Cincinnati, OH. They are a former Sickle Cell Patient Navigator at Five Rivers Health Centers in Dayton, OH. Currently, they are a Care Coordinator at Lighthouse Youth & Family Services in Cincinnati for OhioRISE. Living with Sickle Cell Disease (SCD), they have been involved in sickle cell disease (SCD) research since childhood and continue to contribute as a Community Health Worker, Advocate, and Consultant on Lived Experience for local and national studies on ensuring that data collection reflects meaningful outcomes, and competence for quality trauma-informed care, especially at the intersections of chronic conditions and psychosocial needs.
